The Council is registered under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 as not for profit entity. Hence, no dividend can be declared by the Council.

Material Changes and Commitments

No material changes and commitments affecting the financial position of the Council occurred between the end of the financial year to which this financial statement relates and the date of this report.

Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption, Foreign Exchange Earnings & Outgo:

1. Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption

The particulars as required under the provision of Section 134(3)(m) of the Companies Act, 2013 in respect of conservation of energy and technology absorption have not been furnished considering the nature of activities undertaken by the Council during the year under review.

2. Foreign Exchange Earnings and Outgo

During the financial year 2025-26, the foreign exchange earnings of the Council amounted to Rs.4.82 lakhs as against Rs.33.60 lakhs in the previous year. The expenditure in foreign exchange during the financial year was Rs.1685.59 lakhs as compared to Rs.2719.12 lakhs in the previous year.

Loan, Guarantees or Investments

Particulars of loans given, investment made, guarantees given, if any, and the purpose for which the loan or guarantee and investment is proposed to be utilized are provided in the standalone financial statement in note nos. 1.7 & 1.12.

There were no contracts, arrangements or transactions entered into during Financial year 2025-26 that fall under the scope of Section 188(1) of Companies Act, 2013.

The Council has a proper and adequate internal control system commensurate with its nature of activities and meets the following objectives:

- providing assurance regarding the effectiveness and efficiency of operations;
- efficient use and safeguarding of resources;
- compliance with policies, procedures and applicable laws and regulations; and
- transactions being accurately recorded and promptly reported.

The members of the Working Committee regularly review the adequacy of internal control system.

Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

Provisions relating to CSR, as contained in Section 135 of Companies Act 2013, were not applicable to the Council for the current financial year.

Statutory Auditors

M/s. Ranjit Jain & Co., Chartered Accountants, were re-appointed as the Statutory Auditors of the Council for a term of five years, up to the conclusion of the 74th Annual General Meeting, with the approval of the members. The Working Committee (“the Board”) has further recommended, for the approval of the members, the remuneration payable to M/s. Ranjit Jain & Co. for the financial year 2026–27. The relevant resolution seeking such approval is included in the Notice convening the 71st Annual General Meeting of the Council.

The Statutory Auditors have also confirmed that they continue to satisfy the independence requirements under the Companies Act, 2013, as well as the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

Committee's Comment on the Auditors' Report

The observations of the Statutory Auditors, when read together with the relevant notes to the accounts and accounting policies are self-explanatory. There are no qualification, reservation or adverse remark or disclaimer made by the said auditors in their report.

Cost Records and Cost Audit

Maintenance of cost records and requirement of cost audit as prescribed under the provisions of Section 148 (1) of the Companies Act, 2013 are not applicable for the activities carried out by the Council.

The Committee had appointed Mr. Adhip Mitra (DIN: 10684740), Executive Director & Secretary w.e.f. 01.07.2024 as succession of Mr. Suranjan Gupta (DIN: 0008156826).

Number of Meetings of the Working Committee

During the year, the Council held two Working Committee Meetings on 27th August, 2025 and 24th March, 2026 respectively. The necessary quorum was present for all the meetings. The intervening gap between any two meetings was within the period prescribed by the Companies Act, 2013.

During the year, there were no significant and material orders passed by the regulators or courts or tribunals impacting the going concern status and the Council's operation in future.

Reporting of Frauds by Auditors

During the year under review, the Auditors had not reported to the Working Committee any matter under Section 143 (12) of the Companies Act, 2013, any instances of fraud committed against the Company by its officers or employees, the details of which would need to be mentioned in the Report of Working Committee [i.e. the Board].

As per requirement of The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition & Redressal) Act, 2013 and Rules made there under, your Council has constituted Internal Complaints Committee (ICC). During the year, no complaints were received by the Council.

EXPORT PERFORMANCE

The Working Committee of EEPC INDIA has the pleasure in presenting its report on the activities of EEPC India for the year ended 31st March, 2026.

A. OVERALL EXPORTS UP BY 0.93% DURING FY 2025–26

Based on the latest trade estimates, India's overall merchandise exports during April – March 2025–26 stood at US\$ 441.78 billion, compared with US\$ 437.70 billion during April – March 2024–25, registering a year-on-year growth of 0.93%.

B. PERFORMANCE OF ENGINEERING SECTOR IN FY 2025–26

Indian engineering exports continued their strong growth trajectory and achieved an all-time high of US\$ 122.43 billion during FY 2025–26, compared with US\$ 116.75 billion in FY 2024–25, recording a growth of 4.86%. This marks the second consecutive year of record engineering exports and the third record performance in the last five fiscal years. Engineering products remained the largest component of India's merchandise exports.

The share of engineering exports in total merchandise exports increased further to 27.71% in FY 2025–26 from 26.67% in FY 2024–25.

C. PERFORMANCE COMMODITY-WISE DURING FY 2025–26 (in comparison to cumulative export performance in 2024–25)

What's up : Copper and products made of copper (+59.2%), Motor vehicles/cars (+23.1%), Two and three wheelers (+24.2%), Iron and steel (+11.5%), Industrial machinery and boilers (+21.1%), Air-condition and refrigeration machinery (+17.6%), Electrical machinery and equipment (+6.8%), Other construction machinery (+19.7%), Lead and products made of lead (+34.2%), Railway transport equipment (+41.2%), Office equipment (+37.1%), Zinc and products made of zinc (+18.7%), Other miscellaneous engineering products (+9.6%).

What's down: Aircraft, spacecraft and parts (-76.1%), Medical and scientific instruments (-2.6%), Ships, boats and floating structures (-4.3%), Prime mica and mica products (-6.0%), Nickel and products made of nickel (-1.0%), Project goods (-43.8%), Hand tools and cutting tools (-1.7%), Cranes, lifts and winches (-1.0%).

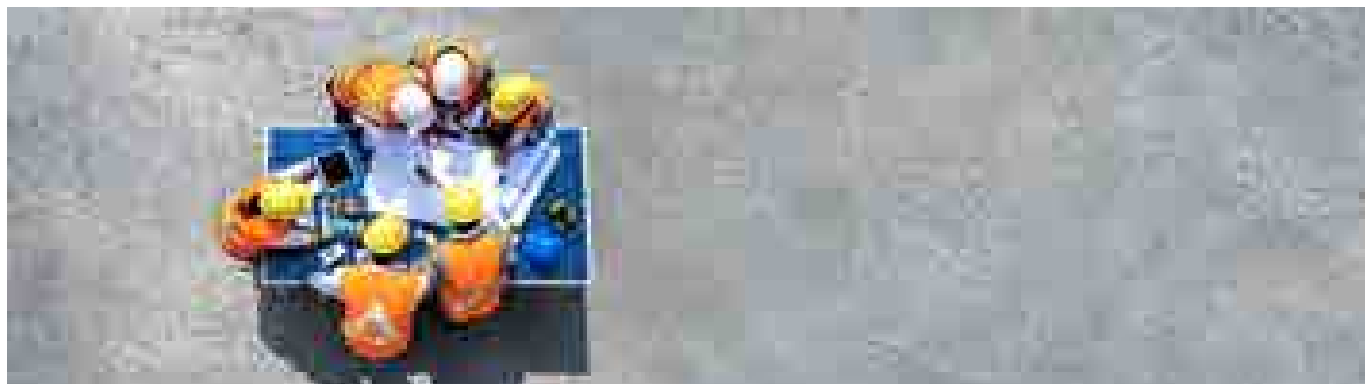

A new edition of monthly magazine ie2 - Indian Engineering Exports, A Film narrating EEPC India's so far 69 year old journey and a Platinum Jubilee logo were launched by Mr. Piyush Goyal, Hon'ble Minister of Commerce & Industry, Government of India at Vanijya Bhavan, New Delhi in presence of Mr. Jitin Prasada, Hon'ble Minister of State for Commerce and Industry, Government of India and Mr. Vimal Anand, Joint Secretary, Department of Commerce, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India.

The most illustrious event was the Platinum Jubilee Celebration in presence of President of India, Smt Droupadi Murmu. During FY25-26, EEPC India had organised around 102 web/ physical and hybrid sessions, led 17 India Pavilions in 17 International Fairs covering 8 Nations in 4 Continents Germany, UAE, Brazil, UK, USA, Saudi Arabia, Czech Republic, Vietnam. There were two trade delegations, one to Turkey and second to Indonesia. There were three International Exhibitions held in India.

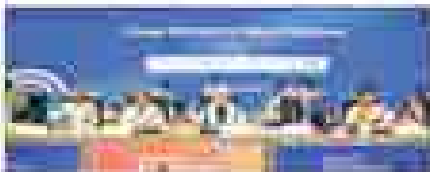
Inter-Ministerial Meet Sets Strategic Tone at Day 1 of the Summit

POLICY MATTERS

Indian engineering sector once again demonstrated its underlying strength as engineering exports from India rose to its all-time high for second consecutive fiscal year in 2025-26 despite several external adversities. This is the third time Indian engineering achieved its all-time high exports in last five fiscals after the Pandemic. During fiscal 2025-26, engineering shipment from India was recorded at USD 122.43 billion as against USD 116.75 billion in the previous fiscal, registering a growth of 4.86%. Engineering is the largest component of merchandise exports with a share of 27.71% during fiscal 2025-26. This record high exports of Indian engineering were led by high exports of Motor vehicles/cars, Copper and its products, Iron and steel, Electric machinery and equipment, Two and three wheelers, products of Iron and steel, Industrial machinery, other Construction machinery, and Auto components/parts among others. Region-wise, North America and European Union remained the top two export destinations for Indian engineering with shares of 20% and 18% respectively in India's global engineering exports. exports to North America increased by 1.9% while that to European Union increased by a higher 8.6% in 2025-26 over the previous fiscal. Exports to all other regions increased in 2025-26 except WANA, other Europe and CIS. The performance is especially remarkable as the export growth came at a time when global trade faced unprecedented challenges in the form of geopolitical crisis in Middle East and West Asia which blocked one of the most prominent trading routes in the region making logistics difficult and expensive.

1. Highlights of the Union Budget 2026-27

The Union Budget 2026–27 deepens India's manufacturing and export competitiveness by expanding sector-specific customs-duty relief and streamlining border processes. Key exemptions include basic customs duty (BCD) waivers on capital goods for lithium-ion cell and battery energy storage manufacturing, on sodium antimonate for solar-glass processing, and on equipment for critical-minerals processing; the nuclear power BCD exemption is extended to 2035 and broadened to all plant capacities. Civil aviation and MRO benefit from BCD relief on components for civilian/training aircraft and on raw materials for defence-sector MRO units, while consumer appliance makers gain exemptions on parts for microwave ovens. A one-time SEZ measure also allows eligible manufacturing units to sell a prescribed share of output to domestic tariff areas at concessional duty rates, supporting scale-up without losing export orientation.

On trade facilitation, the budget strengthens the Authorized Economic Operator regime by doubling the duty-deferral period for tier-2/3 AEOs to 30 days and extending advanced-ruling validity from three to five years, while introducing risk-based treatment for regular importers and automated, electronic-seal clearances from factory to ship. A single digital window for multi-agency cargo approvals is promised by end-FY, with immediate clearance for non-compliance goods after online registration and duty payment, and a two-year rollout of an integrated Customs platform. For e-commerce and engineering exports, the ₹10-lakh courier cap is removed entirely; a ₹20,000-crore, five-year CCUS outlay targets power, steel, cement, refineries and chemicals to raise technology readiness and mitigate CBAM effects. Logistics enablers include dedicated freight corridors (Dankuni–Surat), 20 new waterways, inland ship-repair ecosystems at Varanasi and Patna, and incentives for indigenous seaplane manufacturing.



2. Logistics issues faced by exporters due to West Asia Crisis

The ongoing geopolitical crisis in West Asia has severely disrupted shipping and logistics for Indian engineering exporters. Vessel rerouting and heightened security risks have led to a sharp escalation in logistics costs, with war-risk surcharges increasing by around USD 1,000–1,500 per 20-ft container and USD 4,500–5,000 per 40-ft container, in addition to higher marine insurance premiums. Exporters are also facing container shortages and forced returns of containers, resulting in shipment delays, detention and demurrage at ports, and difficulties in meeting delivery schedules. In addition, disruptions in LPG and gas availability due to regional instability are impacting production operations, particularly for energy-intensive engineering sectors. The issues raised by member exporters were taken up with the appropriate authorities. Relevant government notifications were circulated among members, and in the case of the LPG issue, EEPC recommended the Government to ensure a steady supply of gas to meet at least 80% of the industry's requirement.

3. Lack of clarity regarding the tariff calculation methodology under Section 232

While the reciprocal tariff comes down to 10% from the earlier 50%. Section 232 duties on steel, aluminium, and derivative products continue at 50%. Under the current methodology, this 50% duty applies only to the steel or aluminium content of derivative articles, whereas the non-metal portion is charged the reciprocal tariff now set at 10%. This split-tariff structure and particularly the dual calculation method, has created significant complexity for Indian exporters in determining the correct applicable duties. Some of our member exporters have reported difficulties in interpreting and applying these tariff calculations for their ongoing shipments.

4. Launch of Section 301 investigation by USTR

The USTR has launched a Section 301 investigation targeting India and other countries. While the full impact of the investigation will be understood once it is over, it is expected to impose new tariff on US imports from India and certain other countries once the 150 days for 10% global tariff expires. This is a cause of concern for the Indian exporting community which is already facing a 50% tariff under Section 232 on Steel, Aluminum, Auto and Auto components sector.

5. Suggestions on EU tariff rate quotas (TRQ)

Recently India and the European Union (EU) announced the conclusion of negotiations for a Free Trade Agreement (FTA). At this crucial stage, EEPC India reiterated industry's concerns about the EU's tariff rate quotas (TRQs). Given the importance of stainless-steel long products, industry recommends exempting them from the TRQ regime. Categories 14, 15, and 22 are mainly produced by MSMEs, which make up over half of the sector. Over 70% of Category 14 manufacturers are MSMEs, while India contributes 73% of the EU's global imports in this category. In this context, EEPC India has made the following suggestions during a recent interaction with HCIM:

- Exemption of stainless-steel long products (Categories 14, 15, and 22) from TRQs, given their MSME dominance and strategic importance.
- For other product categories: Increase the quota volumes
- Ensure that out-of-quota tariffs do not exceed 25%, and request for a gradual phase-out over five to six years, especially considering the FTA with the EU.
- Change the quota allocation reference period from 2013 to 2024 to align with current export performance.



6. EU CBAM: Recognising Indian agencies

The EU's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM), which is effective from 1 January 2026, requires Indian steel and aluminium exporters to submit accurate, verified emissions data, and if such data is not verified by EU accredited verifiers, EU importers are forced to use much higher default emission values. As we have already signed an FTA with the EU EEPC India has suggested that India should ensure that audits conducted by Indian agencies are accepted by EU authorities. India should pursue a Mutual Recognition Agreement (MRA) with the EU so that Indian agencies are formally recognized, helping exporters avoid inflated CBAM liabilities and ensuring smoother operations. This has also been taken up with HCM.

7. Inclusion of Chapter 72 (Steel) under the Interest Subvention Scheme

DGFT vide Trade Notice No. 20/2025–26 dated 2 January 2026, has notified the continuation of the Interest Subvention Scheme for pre- and post-shipment export credit. Upon review of the positive list of eligible products provided in Annexure II, it is observed that products falling under Chapter 72 (Steel) have not been included. Chapter 72 constitutes a significant component of India's engineering export basket, accounting for approximately 8–9% of total engineering exports and is also characterized by the presence of many MSMEs. EEPC India requested the government to extend the benefit to at least micro and small enterprises engaged in chapter 72 products.

8. Reduction in RoDTEP rate

On February 2026, the DGFT issued notification number 60/2025-26 regarding rationalization of rates under RoDTEP. As per this notification, the applicable RoDTEP rates on all HS codes as notified in Appendix 4R and Appendix 4RE shall be restricted to 50% of the existing rates and 50% of the notified value caps (wherever applicable) with immediate effect. The industry is of the opinion that RoDTEP is a scheme to reimburse duties and levies associated with export manufacturing which are otherwise non-refundable. Any reduction in these rates may create cost disadvantages for the exporters while facing global competition. Accordingly, the industry strongly recommended that the government re-evaluate the policy changes to maintain the competitiveness of our exports amid challenging global trade conditions. EEPC India has already taken this up with DGFT.

9. Inclusion of Auto Components (CTH 8708) and Complete Bicycles (HSN 871200) under the Interest Subvention Scheme

Based on inputs received from member exporters, EEPC India recommended inclusion of all relevant tariff lines under CTH 8708 (auto components) and HSN 871200 (complete bicycles) under the Interest Subvention Scheme to ensure value-chain parity, wider MSME coverage, and enhanced competitiveness of engineering exports.

10. Mexico PTA

On December 11, 2025, Mexico's Congress approved a sweeping tariff reform targeting imports from countries without a Free Trade Agreement (FTA), including India, China, and several others. The measure, part of President Claudia Sheinbaum's Plan México 2025–2030, will take effect on January 1, 2026. It covers over 1,400 product categories across 17 industrial sectors such as automobiles, auto parts, steel, aluminium, textiles, footwear, plastics, and electronics. Indian engineering exporters especially in auto, steel, and aluminium will be affected, as Mexico is a key market. EEPC India requested the government to consider the possibility of signing a PTA with Mexico.



11. Rare Earth

China's Ministry of Commerce (MOFCOM) and General Administration of Customs (GAC) announced a series of new export control notifications in 2024 and early 2025 which were further expanded in October 2025. Some of these measures were targeted at the entire supply chain of Rare Earth including elements, rare earth magnets and all related extraction and processing equipment, materials and related items. As per the notifications, the export of the products will require an export licence issued by the Government of China. This has created severe challenges for industries using rare earth magnets such as automotive and renewable energy.

- High-power magnets such as Neodymium, Alnico, and Samarium Cobalt—critical for advanced applications—fall under the restricted category. These magnets require rigorous testing for chemical elements like Holmium, Samarium, Terbium, and Dysprosium, and any trace of these elements results in rejection for export.
- Even after providing declarations that the magnets are intended solely for manufacturing magnetic equipment and not for defence use, shipments are frequently rejected during port inspections. Vendors often must return the cargo to their warehouses, causing delays and financial losses. Also, the cost of obtaining dual-use license is approximately \$200 per product type and are valid for only one month, adding to compliance burdens.
- Chinese shipping companies have been instructed not to carry magnetic cargo, and bookings are often denied outright. Movement of magnetic cargo from Shanghai Port faces near-total rejection, while limited chances of clearance exist from Ningbo or Qingdao ports for magnets that do not contain restricted minerals.
- To mitigate these restrictions, Indian importers are increasingly routing shipments through third countries such as Vietnam, Singapore, and Hong Kong, which further increases lead times and landed costs.

EEPC India has reiterated the urgent need for government intervention and support to facilitate procurement of these magnets from China for legitimate industrial use.

12. Recent export controls by China on steel products imported from India

China's Ministry of Commerce (MOFCOM) and General Administration of Customs (GAC) announced Export Licensing Requirement for Steel Producers covering 300 tariff lines via announcement no. 79/2025 dated 09.12.2025. Our observations indicate that in some of these products India has significant import dependency on China hence the announcement may impact Indian user industries adversely.

NOTE : 3: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND OTHER EXPLANATORY INFORMATION

A. Significant Accounting Policies

- 1 Expenditure related to various Code and other specific activities are booked under those functional heads to conform to the budgets approved by the Government of India. As such, expenses shown under various natural heads are not necessarily the total expenditure incurred under these particular heads.
2. Income from Membership Subscription is not taken into account unless received except in case where the Tax Invoice issued under GST was raised for such subscription.
3. Items of printing and stationery are charged to Statement of Income & Expenditure of the year in which the same are purchased, irrespective of the year in which these items are consumed.
4. Pursuant to the policy adopted by the management in the year 1982-83, the expenditure on Publication is directly charged to Statement of Income & Expenditure and no stock of publications at the end of the year is accounted for, as these are considered purely export promotional literature.
5. **Property, Plant & Equipment**
The Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, amortization and impairment loss, if any. The cost comprises the purchase price and other costs attributable to bringing the assets to their working condition for their intended use but excludes duties and taxes recoverable from the taxing authorities.
6. **Depreciation**
The Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, amortization and impairment loss, if any. Depreciation has been provided on the basis of the useful life of the Property, Plant & Equipment prescribed in Schedule – II of the Companies Act, 2013 under the Written Down Value Method.
7. **Foreign Currency Transaction**
 - (a) Transactions in foreign currency are recorded at the rate of exchange prevailing on the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currency as at the Balance Sheet date are translated at rates prevailing at the year end. The resultant net gains or losses are recognized as income or expense in the year in which they arise.
 - (b) Property, Plant & Equipment and Investments acquired in foreign currency are carried at the exchange rates prevailing at the time of acquisition.
8. **Government Grant**
The Council receive various government grants that require compliance with certain conditions related to the Council's operating activities or are provided to the Council by way of financial assistance on the basis of certain qualifying criteria. Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received upon the council complying with the conditions attached to the grant.
9. **Impairment of Assets**
If the carrying amount of property, plant or equipment exceeds the recoverable amount estimated by the management on the reporting date, the carrying amount is reduced to the recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is measured as higher of the net selling price and the value in use determined by the present value of estimated future cash flow.



NOTE : 3: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND OTHER EXPLANATORY INFORMATION (Contd.)

10. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities & Contingent Assets

Provisions involving a substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognised when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Contingent Liabilities are not recognised but are disclosed in the Financial Statements. Contingent Assets are neither recognised nor disclosed in the Financial Statements.

11. The accounting policies not specially discussed above are in consonance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India and are being consistently followed. The financial statements of the Council are presented in Indian Rupees, with amounts expressed in lakhs and rounded off to two decimal places, unless otherwise indicated.

Previous year's figures have been regrouped/re-arranged wherever found necessary.

B. Other Explanatory Information

1. Every member of the Council other than the Officials of Government undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Council in the event of the same being wound up during the time that he was a member or within one year afterwards, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the Council contracted prior to the date on which he ceases to be a member and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up the same and the adjustment of the right of the contributories among themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding Rs.1,000/- in the case of Ordinary Members and Rs.250/- in the case of Associate Members.
2. Secured Loans to employees for house building and purchase of vehicles include cases where mortgage could not be created till the year end.
3. (a) The Council acts as custodian of the International Price Re-imbursement Scheme Fund. Interest earned on this fund has been included as income by simultaneously providing liability for such interest earned on the Custodian Fund.
(b) As at the year end, there are six ongoing litigations in various Courts against the Council in respect of International Price Re-imbursement Scheme. Expenses related to handling/defending these cases aggregating to Rs. 22.07 lakhs (P.Y. Rs. 2.88 lakhs) incurred by the Council, have been adjusted against the aforesaid Custodian Fund.
(c) A special audit of the aforesaid fund and the expenses in connection with the ongoing litigations have been conducted by the Internal Audit Wing, Department of Commerce, Govt. of India in the month of July, 2026, i.e. after the end of the current year. The report of such special audit was, however, not received by the Council till the date of signing of these financial statements.
4. The Council is maintaining a Joint Bank Account for making joint payments on behalf of itself and other occupants in relation to the office space acquired in the International Trade Facilitation Centre at Kolkata. As the Council is only acting as a custodian of this bank account, the same does not form part of its accounts. The said bank account was opened for the convenience of these occupants in making those payments which are common in nature, such as, premises maintenance expenses, security services, electricity, water supply, lift maintenance etc. The funds required for such expenses are contributed by all these occupants on a mutually agreed basis.
5. No provision for Income Tax has been made in the accounts as the Council does not expect any liability on this account.
6. 'Contribution, Fees and Other Receipts' from members as shown in Note 1.13 includes amounts towards exhibitions, publicity, conferences etc.
7. Since account confirmations were not received from many parties, the balances lying in various accounts like Loans & Advances, Deposits, and Trade Payables etc. remain unconfirmed.

9. Accounting in respect of Unbilled Dues and Unbilled Payables as on 31.03.2026 relating to Bharat Electricity Summit 2026 held from 19th March, 2026 to 22nd March, 2026 at Yashobhoomi (IICC) in Dwarka, New Delhi:

(a) Recognition of Unbilled Receivables / Accrued Income

Though the aforesaid event was completed during the financial year ended 31st March, 2026, the billing formalities for a part of income/ receivables could not be completed by 31st March, 2026 as full required information was not received upto that date.

Unbilled dues as on 31.03.2026 aggregating to Rs.1,461.30 lakhs, as shown in Note: 1.9.1 of Trade Receivables ageing schedule represent Unbilled Receivables / Accrued Income upto 31st March, 2026 in respect of the aforesaid event, which have been recognised on the basis of the underlying agreements, records and other supporting documents.

(b) Unbilled Liabilities / Accrued Expenses

Certain vendors/service providers engaged in connection with the Bharat Electricity Summit 2026 have submitted their invoices subsequent to 31st March, 2026, although the related goods/services in connection with the said event were supplied/ rendered or consumed before the close of the financial year on 31-03-2026.

Unbilled payables as on 31.03.2026, include a sum of Rs. 2,002.98 lakhs provided on account of expenses / liabilities already incurred by the Council in respect of the aforesaid event for which the concerned vendors/service providers did not raise their bills till 31-03-2026 which shown under the aggregate amount of Rs.2,007.73 lakhs, as shown in Note: 1.3.1 of Trade Payables ageing schedule. The determination of aforesaid liability is based on the underlying transactions, contractual arrangements, services rendered/goods received, event-related records and other relevant supporting documentation available as at the reporting date.

(c) Basis of Recognition

The above accounting treatment has been made to ensure that income earned and expenditure incurred in connection with the Bharat Electricity Summit 2026 are recognised in the financial year to which they relate, in accordance with the accrual basis of accounting and the matching principle.

The amounts so recognised as Unbilled Dues and Unbilled Payables will be adjusted by the Council against the corresponding invoices/bills raised or received subsequent to the reporting date.

10. Write-off of Government Grant short allowed in respect of Bharat Mobility Global Expo 2025

During the financial year 2024-25, the Council recognised Government Grant Receivable amounting to Rs. 438.32 lakhs in respect of the grant-in-aid sanctioned.

under the MAI Scheme for organising the Bharat Mobility Global Expo, 2025. Against the said receivable, Rs. 68.32 lakhs only were received during the financial year 2025-26, resulting in a balance of Rs. 370.00 lakhs remaining outstanding as at 31 March, 2026.

The Council has been continuously pursuing the matter with the concerned Ministry/Government authorities for release of the balance grant. In this regard, the Council has also submitted the revised Statement of Expenditure and made necessary representations/correspondence with the Ministry for finalisation of the event accounts and release of the grant.

However, despite such continued follow-up and representations, there was no reasonable certainty as at the year-end on 31-03-2026 that the aforesaid balance amount of grant will ultimately be released to the Council. In view of the uncertainty surrounding the recoverability/receipt of the outstanding grant, the Management, as a matter of prudence, has written off the Government Grant Receivable amounting to Rs. 370.00 lakhs during FY 2025-26 and the same has been charged to the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

The above write-off is without prejudice to the Council's ongoing efforts and representations before the concerned Ministry/Government authorities for release of the grant. In the event the amount is subsequently sanctioned and received, the same will be recognised in the financial statements in the year of receipt/when the recognition criteria are satisfied, as applicable.
