**Foreword** 

I feel proud to put pen to paper as INDEE – The Indian Engineering Exhibition completes 39 years of its existence as it touched base with Phnom Penh, Cambodia on the February 18th. This year more than 70 Indian Firms participated in this mega Engineering Exposition. After traversing the Globe, this has been the first INDEE in Cambodia.

In the context of India's 'Look East' policy and the ASEAN, Cambodia is an important interlocutor and a good partner. Cambodia has been a strong proponent of enhanced interaction between India and the ASEAN. Within ASEAN, Cambodia's interaction with India has enhanced substantially since July 2009 when Cambodia took over as Country Coordinator for India for a three-year period. There are about 1500 Indian nationals working in various fields in Cambodia. Most of them are based in Phnom Penh. The Indians in Cambodia have formed an association called 'Indian Association—Cambodia.' Phnom Penh has a street named after Jawaharlal Nehru. A bust of Mahatma Gandhi, gifted by India, was installed at a prominent location in Phnom Penh which speak volumes on Indian presence in Cambodian soil. 114.13% rise in Indo-Cambodia trade during 2010-15 is aided by of the most relaxed trade regimes in the world as offered by Cambodia.

India - Asia's Third Largest Economy is considered as a beacon of stability with narrowed CAD, steady disinflation and fiscal rectitude. Despite the incumbent dip of 16% in Engineering Exports during April - December 2015-16 on Year on Year basis, there has been a 10.4 % growth of engineering exports during 2008-2014, which has made Engineering Exports the highest contributor to India's overall outbound shipments. The sudden fall has been attributed to reduced demand primarily attributed by the slump in China. However it is worth to note, Engineering Exports to Cambodia registered a 9.35% growth during 2015.

We are thankful to H.E.Naveen Srivastava, Ambassador of India to Cambodia, Cambodia Chamber of Commerce, FASMEC, Indian Chamber of Commerce in Cambodia, Cambodia Women Entrepreneurs Association for their patronage in making this event happen.

This 32nd edition of INDEE has proved to be very beneficial for most participants and I am sure that the coming months will pave the way forward for joint ventures, investments and hectic business activities both in India and Cambodia.

#### Message from Executive Director & Secretary

EEPC India feels proud as it would complete 39 years since 1977 when the first edition of INDEE took place in Singapore and now it would be the 31ST INDEE in three decades covering 24 countries and 5 continents which underscore its immense popularity.

This would be our First INDEE in Cambodia – the country of the Great Angkor Wat, the largest religious monument of the World. We are happy to invite a contingent of over 60 exhibitors this year.

We are optimistic about India's prospects with a Disinflation, Narrowed CAD and Fiscal Deficit. World Bank has predicted India to be the fastest growing economy in the world in the next three years who would outpace China. For FY 2016–17, India, the dominant economy in the region is projected to grow by 7.8 % in 2016 and 7.9% in the next two years. The recent Start Up Initiative of our Prime Minister is a great opportunity for brand India to showcase how Indians are now graduating from being workers to creating employment. Additionally in a bid to boost exports, duty benefits have been accorded to several products under Merchandise Exports from India Scheme (MEIS) which includes engineering products which has witnessed a dismal export performance during the current fiscal with a 14.75 % fall in December 2015.

The Indian engineering sector is a growing market. Engineering Exports is the highest foreign exchange earner accounting for 20–21% of the national export pie. 'Make in India', 'Brand India Engineering campaigns', have received the attention of several infrastructure and engineering multinationals.

India-Cambodia relations goes back to the 1st century AD when Hindu and Buddhist religious and cultural influences emanated out of India to various parts of South-East Asia. The total Bilateral Trade for 2013–14 was USD 153.98 million while actual figures might be higher when indirect trade between the two sides through other ASEAN countries is considered. However, the bilateral trade is modest and there exists much room for further expansion and increase. Although some Indian companies have already set up their base in Cambodia, there are many aspiring entrants since the country offers the most relaxed regime for bilateral trade.

According to a report by McKinsey, by 2025, the Indian manufacturing export sector is expected to grow to \$1 trillion, contributing 25–30 percent of country's GDP with the potential of creating 90 million jobs. More than 50 percent of investors are looking at India because of its high domestic demand.

I am confident this edition of INDEE would generate more business opportunities in engineering trade and would act as a springboard for deepening the existing ties.

I wish all the participants an enjoyable stay in Cambodia and I end with a special thank you note for Indian Embassy in Phnom Penh and Ministry of Commerce and Industries whose untiring support enabled us to organise the show.

#### Message from Chairman of the Territorial Committee on ASEAN, EEPC India

Geographically, Cambodia lies at the heart of ASEAN. For us in India, our relationship with Cambodia is a key element of our engagement with ASEAN. The 10 members ASEAN and India share an ancient and deep economic, cultural and societal ties which in contemporary times has received a greater thrust by India's 'Look East' policy and the reciprocation of the same from the ASEAN member countries. By signing the FTA with ASEAN in 2010, India has taken a strategic step not only of "look east", but also "act east". The FTA is one of the largest FTAs in which the population of 1.8 billion with a combined GDP of USD 2.8 trillion has been involved.

AEAN - comprising Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam - and India were targeting US\$ 100 billion in trade by 2015. Exports to the region account for more than 10% of our global exports. India and ASEAN are becoming relatively more important in each other's trade baskets. Total engineering trade has increased between India and the ASEAN region following the FTA implementation from US\$ 7.84 billion in 2007-08 to US\$ 14.82 billion in 2014-15.

India-Cambodia relations goes back to the 1st century AD when Hindu and Buddhist religious and cultural influences emanated out of India to various parts of South-East Asia. Cambodians are today predominantly Buddhist but retain a strong influence of Hindu rituals, idolatry and mythology. The pervading influence of Hinduism, Buddhism, and Indian architecture are borne out by the magnificent structures at Angkor Wat, Angkor Thom, Bayon, Ta Phrom and other religious and historical sites in Cambodia. The ralxed trade regime of Cambodia have been conducive in raising Indo Cambodian Trade from US\$ 74.95 million during 2010-11 to US\$ 160.49 Million during 2014-15 marking a rise in share from 0.01% to 0.02% of India's total trade.

An event of INDEE's stature in Cambodia is a welcoming move by EEPC India to explore the ample room of deepening and widening of Indo-Cambodia Trade horizon. I am sure this edition of INDEE being held during 18-20 February, 2016 with a group of over 60 Indian Companies in Engineering Sector would provide more avenues of bilateral business expansion.

I wish all the exhibitors and participants a fruitful stay and interaction.

EEPC INDIA organized its 32nd Indian Engineering Exhibition (INDEE) from 18-20 February 2016 at Diamond Island (Koh Pich) Convention & Exhibition Centre, Phnom Penh, Cambodia. EEPC India touched base with Cambodia for the first time after traversing the Globe with INDEE.

#### Why Cambodia?

Cambodia has undergone a drastic change from an under developed country to a widely urbanized Kingdom due to massive developments and improvements in the different sectors.



## **FEEDBACK ANALYSIS**



There were more than 1000 serious business visitors attended the show during 18-20 February, 2016

83% of the participants established business contacts



Average No. of serious visitor received by each exhibitor - 6.75.

#### Outcome

- 378 contacts generated, ie 6.75 per company. The maximum number ofcontacts have been generated by VNS Switchgear
- M/s Meera & Ceiko Pumps have received a spot order worth \$6000
- Nearly70% of the respondents found the arrangements made by EEPC India to be excellent and good. Around 20% found them to be average. The rest thought it was poor.

## Suggestions

- 1. Preparations for an INDEE have to begin six months in advance.
- Cambodia was probably the first-ever LDC where an INDEE has been organised. An LDC is typically marked by very low level of industrialisation. Hence, it would be worthwhile to arrange for investment summit in association with the local investment promotion agency on the sidelines of the INDEE for such markets.
- It has been experienced that high freight component and time of delivery were rendering Indian exports to Cambodia less competitive. It is therefore suggested that the possibility should be explored of having warehouses/showrooms catering to the economic region where INDEE is being held.
- We should collect HS Codes from the members at the time of accepting applications.





India-Cambodia relations goes back to the 1st century AD when Hindu and Buddhist religious and cultural influences emanated out of India to various parts of South-East Asia. Cambodians are today predominantly Buddhist but retain a strong influence of Hindu rituals, idolatry and mythology. The pervading influence of Hinduism, Buddhism, and Indian architecture are borne out by the magnificent structures at Angkor Wat, Angkor Thom, Bayon, Ta Phrom and other religious and historical sites in Cambodia.

India-Cambodia bilateral relations are warm and cordial. In the 1950s, India was associated with the International Control Commission on Indo-China. After the collapse of the Khmer Rouge regime, India recognized the new government and opened its Embassy in Phnom Penh in 1981 when much of the world shunned Cambodia. This factor along with India's association with the Paris Peace Accords and their finalization in 1991 is fondly remembered by the Cambodian leadership. India also committed military and non-military personnel for the conduct of the UNTAC-sponsored elections in 1993. India was one of the original

contributors to UN de-mining operations in Cambodia. Furthermore, Government of India responded to an appeal by Cambodian Government to undertake the conservation of the famous Angkor Wat temple during the period 1986 to 1993 at a cost of US\$ 4 million, at a time when peace in the country was yet to be settled.

Contemporary times have witnessed expansion of cooperation in diverse fields such as institutional capacity building, human resource development, extension of financial assistance in infrastructure projects, security and defence. On the political front, there has been regular exchange of high level visits. From India, prominent high level visits included Vice President (2001), Prime Minister (2002 and 2012), External Affairs Minister (2003 and 2012), Commerce & Industry Minister (2003 and 2012), Minister of State for External Affairs (2006), Water Resources Minister (2008 & 2010), Panchayati Raj Minister (2009), President (Sept 2010) and Minister of State for Petroleum and Natural Gas (2012). Cambodian Dy. PM and Foreign Minister Hor Namhong paid an official visit to India in 2007 and 2012.



Cambodian PM Hun Sen had visited India many times and the last one was in December 2012 to take part in the 20th anniversary of ASEAN-India dialogue partnership, held in New Delhi. From Cambodia, other prominent recent visits to India included a multi-party parliamentary delegation (2010), Commerce Minister (2008, 2011) and Minister of Cults & Religion (2010). The first round of Foreign Office Consultations (FOC) between India and Cambodia was held in Phnom Penh on 29 November, 2011.

Total bilateral trade in the year 2011-12 was US\$ 107.07 million (Indian export of US\$ 99.45 million and import of US\$ 7.62 million). A beginning has been made in the year 2011 of Indian private sector investment in Cambodia with a US\$ 85 million project to establish sugar plantation, sugar factory, power plant, rice milling facility etc. Potential exists for enhanced economic engagement between the two countries. A number of trade delegations visited Cambodia during last year to explore business opportunities and held buyers-sellers meets. In order to promote trade with Cambodia, India has extended duty free tariff preference scheme to Cambodia since June 2009. Bank of India opened its branch in Phnom Penh in May, 2009. The Embassy has helped establish an Indian Chamber of Commerce to promote bilateral trade and investment ties. Recently, "Small Business-Big Opportunities: A Business Event on SME Cooperation" was organized jointly by the Federation of Association for Small and Medium Enterprises of Cambodia (FASMEC) and the Embassy of India in Phnom Penh on December 8, 2012. A large business delegation from Cambodia participated in the ASEAN-India Business Forum in December 2012.

India has been contributing to capacity building in Cambodia and has set up in Phnom Penh a Cambodia-India Entrepreneurship Development Centre (CIEDC) in February. 2006 and Cambodia-India Centre for English Language Training (CICELT) in August, 2007. Cambodia is a major recipient of India's ITEC programme and has utilized around 1000 civilian training slots and about 100 defence training slots till date. Taking note of increasing demand for civilian training courses, slots for Cambodia under ITEC have been enhanced to 100 from 2011-12. Separately, 15 education scholarships are offered every year, 10 under MGC and 5 under GCSS. An Indian expert in water management was deputed for one year period from June '09 to June '10 under ITEC to assist APSARA Authority at Siem Reap. Work on establishing India Cambodia Center of Excellence & Talent Development (ICCETD) has begun. These Centers will be established at Phnom Penh, Siem Reap and Sihanoukville.

There have been regular exchanges of cultural troupe performances. Indian TV serials (Zee TV and Star Plus) and Hindi movies (dubbed in Khmer) are quite popular. A Chair on Buddhist & Sanskrit Studies has been set up at Preah Sihanouk Raja Buddhist University and has been operational from Oct 2010. Dr. Karan Singh. during his visit in 2011, was conferred the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters by the Preah Sihanouk Raia Buddhist University. An ICCR-sponsored International Conference on Buddhism Heritage in South East Asia was organized at Phnom Penh on 3-4 December, 2010 with participation of scholars from India, Cambodia, China, Vietnam, Thailand and Indonesia. Recently, the 2nd ASEAN-India Car Rally visited Cambodia from 5-6 December, 2012 and to celebrate the occasion, the Indian Embassy in Cambodia arranged a successful cultural event CHARISHNU, attended by over 1200 people over 2 days, at the Chaktomuk Theatre in Phnom Penh on 4-5 December. The Embassy also organised performances by Shwaas, a world music band from India twice at Phnom Penh and once at Sihanoukville to capacity audiences.

India has extended bilateral financial assistance to Cambodia through Grants and Lines of Credit. Since December, 2003, a team of ASI has been working for restoration of Ta Prohm Temple in Siem Reap with funds provided under ITEC programme. Several projects under India's Lines of Credit in the areas of electric transmission lines (US\$ 30 million) and irrigation projects (US\$ 30 million) are under implementation. India made a bilateral contribution of US\$ 1 million for the Khmer Rouge Tribunal, the first country to pledge a cash contribution to Cambodia's national share of the court of the Tribunal. Proposal for installation of 1500 hand-pumps at a cost of US\$ 8.48 million in rural Cambodia under grants-in-aid is under process. India is providing financial assistance of approx. US\$ 1.772 million for setting up of the MGC Asian Traditional Textiles Museum at Siem Reap under Mekong Ganga Cooperation (MGC) initiative, for which construction of the building has been completed in end December 2011. India has also provided disaster relief and humanitarian assistance to Cambodia when needed. During 2002, India gifted medicines and 10,000 tonnes of rice. India gifted 26,000 jars of indelible ink to Cambodia for the general elections in July, 2003. India provided a cash donation of US\$ 100,000 to provide relief for the



victims of the floods in 2011.

In the last few years, there has been a steady enhancement of defence cooperation between the two countries. Exchange of visits of defence officials, goodwill visits by Indian Naval Ships (most recently on 12-15 January 2012, Indian Sail Training Ship — INS SUDARSHINI visited Sihanoukville Port of Cambodia), gift of medical equipments & other stores and imparting of training courses to RCAF personnel in demining and peace keeping operations (the 6 th annual three-week demining training course and the second UN peacekeeping training course was conducted on 18 July to 7 Aug 2012), are some of the activities undertaken by the two countries. On the security front, India and Cambodia have signed an Agreement on Combating International Terrorism, Organized Crimes and Illicit Drug Trafficking in December, 2005.

India and Cambodia cooperate in a number of multilateral and regional fora. Cambodia has consistently supported India's candidature in the UN and other international organizations. PM Hun Sen formally declared his country's open support in favour of India for permanent membership of the UNSC at the South Summit Conference in Havana in April 2000. Cambodia has time and again reiterated this support at various international fora and during bilateral interactions. In the context of our 'Look East' policy and the ASEAN, Cambodia is an important interlocutor and a good partner.

Cambodia has been a strong proponent of enhanced interaction between India and the ASEAN, and played a pivotal role in achieving the goal of the ASEAN-India Summit, held for the first time in Phnom Penh in November 2002. Cambodia supported India within the ASEAN for participation in the first East Asia Summit meeting held in December 2005 in Kuala Lumpur. Within ASEAN, Cambodia's interaction with India has enhanced substantially since July 2009 when Cambodia took over as Country Coordinator for India for a three years period. The first meeting of the ASEAN-India Eminent Persons Group (AIEPG) was held in Phnom Penh on 3 August, 2011. The AIEPG have put forward visionary recommendations on moving forward and deepening the India-ASEAN cooperation which was adopted at the ASEAN-India Summit in Nov 2012 in Phnom Penh. Cambodian Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs & International Cooperation Hor Namhong led a high level delegation to India from 13- 14 February, 2012 to attend Delhi Dialogue-IV under the theme: "India and ASEAN: Partners for Peace, Progress and Stability".

The 14th ASEAN-India Senior Officials' Meeting was held in Phnom Penh on 27 May, 2012. Shri S.M. Krishna visited Phnom Penh from 10-12 July, to attend the 10th ASEAN-India Foreign Ministers Meeting, the 2nd East Asia Summit Foreign Ministers Meeting and the 19th ASEAN Regional Forum Ministerial Meeting. Cambodian Minister of Commerce Cham Prasiddh visited Guwahati and New Delhi in December 2012 to attend the ASEAN India Business Forum.

There have been regular high level meetings between the Prime Ministers of both countries. Premiers of the two countries held a bilateral interaction on 18 November, 2011 at Bali on the sidelines of ASEAN and EAS Summits. Dr. Manmohan Singh accompanied by his wife Smt. Gursharan Kaur led a high level delegation to Cambodia on 18-20 November 2012 to participate in the 10th ASEAN-India Summit and the 7th East Asia Summit held in Phnom Penh. Cambodian PM Hun Sen travelled to New Delhi to attend the ASEAN-India Commemorative Summit in December 2012.

There are about 1500 Indian nationals working in various fields in Cambodia. Most of them are based in the capital city, Phnom Penh. The Indians in Cambodia have formed an association called 'Indian Association — Cambodia' and are very active, organizing various events and celebrating Indian festivals through the year. Phnom Penh has a street named after Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru. A bust of Mahatma Gandhi, gifted by India, has been installed at a prominent location in Phnom Penh.





Most Cambodians consider themselves to be Khmers. descendants of the Angkor Empire that extended over much of Southeast Asia and reached its zenith between the 10th and 13th centuries. Attacks by the Thai and Cham (from present-day Vietnam) weakened the empire, ushering in a long period of decline. The king placed the country under French protection in 1863, and it became part of French Indochina in 1887. Following Japanese occupation in World War II, Cambodia gained full independence from France in 1953. In April 1975, after a five-year struggle, communist Khmer Rouge forces captured Phnom Penh and evacuated all cities and towns. At least 1.5 million Cambodians died from execution, forced hardships, or starvation during the Khmer Rouge regime under POL POT. A December 1978 Vietnamese invasion drove the Khmer Rouge into the countryside, began a 10-year Vietnamese occupation, and touched off almost 13 years of civil war.

The 1991 Paris Peace Accords mandated democratic elections and a cease-fire, which was not fully respected by the Khmer Rouge. UN-sponsored elections in 1993 helped restore some semblance of normalcy under a coalition government. Factional fighting in 1997 ended the first coalition government, but a second round of national

elections in 1998 led to the formation of another coalition government and renewed political stability. The remaining elements of the Khmer Rouge surrendered in early 1999. Some of the surviving Khmer Rouge leaders have been tried or are awaiting trial for crimes against humanity by a hybrid UN-Cambodian tribunal supported by international assistance. Elections in July 2003 were relatively peaceful, but it took one year of negotiations between contending political parties before a coalition government was formed. In October 2004, King Norodom SIHANOUK abdicated the throne and his son, Prince Norodom SIHAMONI, was selected to succeed him. The most recent local (Commune Council) elections were held in Cambodia in 2012, with little of the preelection violence that preceded prior elections. National elections in July 2013 were disputed, with the opposition - the Cambodian National Rescue Party (CNRP) - boycotting the National Assembly. The political impasse was ended nearly a year later, with the CNRP agreeing to enter parliament in exchange for ruling party commitments to electoral and legislative reforms.

#### **Economy**

Cambodia has experienced strong economic growth over the last decade. Cambodian GDP grew at an average annual rate of over 8% between 2000 and 2010 and at least 7% since 2011. The tourism, garment, construction and real estate, and agriculture sectors accounted for the bulk of growth. Around 600,000 people, the majority of whom

are women, are employed in the garment and footwear sector. An additional 500,000 Cambodians are employed in the tourism sector, and a further 50,000 people in construction. The tourism industry has continued to grow rapidly with foreign arrivals exceeding 2 million per year since 2007 and reaching around 4.5 million visitors in 2014. Mining also is attracting some investor interest and the government has touted opportunities for mining bauxite, gold, iron and gems.

Cambodia remains one of the poorest countries in Asia and long-term economic development remains a daunting challenge, inhibited by endemic corruption, limited educational opportunities, high income inequality, and poor job prospects. As of 2012, approximately 2.66 million people live on less than \$1.20 per day, and 37% of Cambodian children under the age of 5 suffer from chronic malnutrition. More than 50% of the population is less than 25 years old. The population lacks education and productive skills, particularly in the impoverished countryside, which also lacks basic infrastructure.

The Cambodian Government has been working with bilateral and multilateral donors, including the Asian Development Bank, the World Bank and IMF, to address the country's many pressing needs; more than 30% of the government budget comes from donor assistance. A major economic challenge for Cambodia over the next





decade will be fashioning an economic environment in which the private sector can create enough jobs to handle Cambodia's demographic imbalance. The government is moving forward with new legislation to meet requirements for the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Economic Community.

#### **Culture**

Various factors contribute to the Cambodian culture including Theravada Buddhism, Hinduism, French colonialism, Angkorian culture, and modern globalisation. The Cambodian Ministry of Culture and Fine Arts is responsible for promoting and developing Cambodian culture. Cambodian culture not only includes the culture of the lowland ethnic majority, but also some 20 culturally distinct hill tribes colloquially known as the Khmer Loeu, a term coined by Norodom Sihanouk to encourage unity between the highlanders and lowlanders.

Rural Cambodians wear a krama scarf which is a unique aspect of Cambodian clothing. The sampeah is a traditional Cambodian greeting or a way of showing respect to others. Khmer culture, as developed and spread by the Khmer empire, has distinctive styles of dance, architecture and sculpture, which have been exchanged with neighbouring Laos and Thailand throughout history. Angkor Wat (Angkor means "city" and Wat "temple") is the best preserved example of Khmer architecture from the Angkorian era along with hundreds of other temples that have been discovered in and around the region.

Traditionally, the Khmer people have a recorded information on Tra leaves. Tra leaf books record legends of the Khmer people, the Ramayana, the origin of Buddhism and other prayer books. They are taken care of by wrapping in cloth to protect from moisture and the climate.[154]

Bon Om Tuuk (Festival of Boat Racing), the annual boat rowing contest, is the most attended Cambodian national festival. Held at the end of the rainy season when the Mekong river begins to sink back to its normal levels allowing the Tonle Sap River to reverse flow, approximately 10% of Cambodia's population attends this event each year to play games, give thanks to the moon, watch fireworks, dine, and attend the boat race in a carnival-type atmosphere.[155]

Popular games include cockfighting, soccer, and kicking a sey, which is similar to a footbag. Based on the classical Indian solar calendar and Theravada Buddhism, the Cambodian New Year is a major holiday that takes place in April. Recent artistic figures include singers Sinn Sisamouth and Ros Serey Sothea (and later Meng Keo Pichenda), who introduced new musical styles to the country.
