Dividend

The Council is registered under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 as not for profit entity. Hence, no dividend can be declared by the Council.

Material Changes and Commitments

No material changes and commitments affecting the financial position of the Council occurred between the end of the financial year to which this financial statement relates and the date of this report.

Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption, Foreign Exchange Earnings & Outgo

1. Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption

The particulars as required under the provision of Section 134(3)(m) of the Companies Act, 2013 in respect of conservation of energy and technology absorption have not been furnished considering the nature of activities undertaken by the Council during the year under review.

2. Foreign Exchange Earnings and Outgo

During the financial year 2022-23, the foreign exchange earnings of the Council amounted to Rs.34.45 lakhs as against Rs.0.00 lakh in the previous year. The expenditure in foreign exchange during the financial year was Rs. 2986.35 lakhs as compared to Rs. 290.61 lakh in the previous year.

Loan, Guarantees or Investments

Particulars of loans given, investment made, guarantees given, if any, and the purpose for which the loan or guarantee and investment is proposed to be utilised are provided in the standalone financial statement in note nos 2.7 & 2.12.

Internal Financial Control and its Adequacy

The Council has a proper and adequate internal control system commensurate with its nature of activities and meets the following objectives:

- providing assurance regarding the effectiveness and efficiency of operations;
- efficient use and safeguarding of resources;
- compliance with policies, procedures and applicable laws and regulations; and
- transactions being accurately recorded and promptly reported.

The members of the Working Committee regularly review the adequacy of internal control system.

Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

Provisions relating to CSR, as contained in Section 135 of Companies Act 2013, were not applicable to the Council for the current financial year.

Committee Responsibility Statement

As stipulated in Section 134(3)(c) of the Companies Act, 2013, your Committee subscribes to the "Committee Responsibility Statement" and confirms as under:

- 1) That in the preparation of the Annual Accounts for the financial year ended March 31, 2023, the applicable accounting standards have been followed and there are no material departures;
- 2) That for preparing financial statements, the Committee has selected such accounting policies and made such judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent so as to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Council at the end of the financial year;
- 3) That the Committee has taken proper and sufficient care for the maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 for safeguarding the assets of the Council and for preventing and detecting fraud and other irregularities;
- 4) That the Committee has prepared the Annual Accounts of the Council on a going concern basis;
- 5) That the Committee has laid down internal financial controls to be followed by the Council and such internal financial controls are adequate and were operating effectively; and
- 6) That the Committee has devised proper systems to ensure proper compliance with the provisions of all applicable laws and that such systems were adequate and operating effectively.

Auditors and Auditors' Report

Statutory Auditors

Under Section 139 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules made thereunder, it is mandatory to rotate the statutory auditors on completion of the maximum term permitted under the provisions of Companies Act, 2013. In line with the requirements of the Companies Act, 2013, M/s. Ranjit Jain & Co., Chartered Accountants, were appointed as the statutory auditors of the Council for a period of five consecutive years from the conclusion of the 64th AGM till the conclusion of the 69th AGM due to be held in the year 2024. The requirement for the annual ratification of auditors' appointment at the AGM has been omitted pursuant to Companies (Amendment) Act, 2017 notified on May 7, 2018.

During the year, the statutory auditors have confirmed that they satisfy the independence criteria required under the Companies Act, 2013 and Code of ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

Committee's Comment on the Auditors' Report

The observations of the Statutory Auditors, when read together with the relevant notes to the accounts and accounting policies are self-explanatory. There are no qualification, reservation or adverse remark or disclaimer made by the said auditors in their report.

Cost Records and Cost Audit

Maintenance of cost records and requirement of cost audit as prescribed under the provisions of Section 148 (1) of the Companies Act, 2013 are not applicable for the activities carried out by the Council.

Number of Meetings of the Working Committee

During the year, the Council held four Working Committee Meetings on 17th June 2022, 6th September 2022, 11th October 2022 and 03rd February 2023 respectively. The necessary quorum was present for all the meetings. The intervening gap between any two meetings was within the period prescribed by the Companies Act, 2013.



Significant and Material Orders, if any

During the year, there were no significant and material orders passed by the regulators or courts or tribunals impacting the going concern status and the Council's operation in future.

Reporting of Frauds by Auditors

During the year under review, the Auditors had not reported to the Working Committee any matter under Section 143 (12) of the Companies Act, 2013, any instances of fraud committed against the Company by its officers or employees, the details of which would need to be mentioned in the Report of Working Committee [i.e. the Board].

Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Workplace

As per requirement of The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition & Redressal) Act, 2013 and Rules made thereunder, your Council has constituted Internal Complaints Committee (ICC). During the year, no complaints were received by the Council.

Compliance with Secretarial Standards

The Council is in compliance with the applicable Secretarial Standards issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India and approved by the Central Government under Section 118(10) of the Act.

Particulars of Employees

There was no employee of the Council who received remuneration in excess of the limit prescribed under Section 197 of the Companies Act, 1956 read with Rule 5 of the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration) Rules, 2014.

EXPORT PERFORMANCE

The Working Committee of EEPC INDIA has the pleasure in presenting its report on the activities of EEPC India for the year ended 31st March, 2023.

A. OVERALL EXPORTS DOWN BY 7.08% DURING APRIL 2022 - MARCH 2023

Based on the provisional data published by DGCl&S Cumulative value of exports for the period April-March 2022-23 was US\$ 447.46 billion (INR 3620630.94 crore) as against US\$ 422 billion (INR 3147021.49 crore) in the previous year registering a growth of 6.03 per cent in Dollar terms and 15.05 per cent in Rupee terms over the same period last year.

B. PERFORMANCE OF ENGINEERING SECTOR IN FY 2022-2023

According to the provisional data available from DGCl&S up to March 2023, India's export of engineering goods have registered a decline of 4.57% in US\$ Million during the financial year 2022-23 in comparison to the same period in the previous fiscal. The provisional data indicates the exports of engineering goods from India have reached USD 107.04 billion up in March 2023 in comparison to USD 112.16 billion in the previous fiscal.

In rupee terms, cumulative engineering exports in fiscal 2022-23 recorded 2.77 percent growth year-on-year.

The share of engineering exports in total merchandise exports came to 23.9% which is lower than the last fiscal.

PUBLICITY AND PROMOTION

2022-23 was the dual celebration of 75 years of India's Independence and the period when India assumed the Presidency of G20 for a year. On December 1, 2022, India took over the Presidency of the G20 (formally known as the Group of 20) for the first time since it was founded in 1999 after the Asian Financial Crisis. The 75 week countdown as part of Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav was observed by narrating the Indian Engineering Brilliance over 75 different slides.



During FY22-23, EEPC India had organised 100 web/physical and hybrid sessions, led 33 India Pavilions in 33 International Fairs covering 20 Nations in 5 Continents Germany, Bangladesh, Thailand, Italy, Jordan, UK, South Africa, Malaysia, UAE, Bulgaria, South Korea, Tanzania, Colombia, Vietnam, USA, Nigeria, Sweden, Indonesia, Mexico, Nepal, There were 7 RBSMs across the year including the biggest Engineering showdown – IESS which turned X this FY 2023. One of the India Pavilions was converted to INDEE in Tanzania which became the 42nd INDEE and Tanzania was the 28th nation.

Objectives of the Conclave

It was another year of all-time high exports for Indian merchandise in 2022-23 with USD 447.5 billion of exports and 6.03% growth over the previous fiscal. However, for Indian engineering exports, fiscal 2022-23 was somewhat depressing with 4.57 percent decline over the previous fiscal. Engineering exports in fiscal 2022-23 was recorded at a lower USD 107.04 million from an all-time high of USD 112.16 million in fiscal 2021-22. During the fiscal, engineering exports conceded year-on-year decline in all months from July 2022 to March 2023 barring November 2022 that only managed a marginal growth. Exports of Iron and Steel, the highest contributor in India's engineering shipment was down significantly due to imposition of 15% export tax by the domestic government in May 2022 which was later withdrawn in November 2022. On the global front, demand for steel was subdued due to slowdown in developed region and also in emerging economies like China. Excluding Iron and Steel, Indian engineering exports rather achieved 4.91% growth in 2022-23 over the previous fiscal.

Other than the adversity on steel exports, geo-political crisis in CIS region led by Russia-Ukraine war, economic slowdown in the North-East Asia especially China, crisis in the South-East Asia and slowdown in Europe are the major factors responsible for lower shipment of engineering goods from India.

A. Revised Engineering Export Target Overachieved

Despite of a downfall in engineering shipment, one good thing was the overachievement of target in 2022-23 too. The revised target or predicted value of engineering exports was set at USD 105.82 billion by the government while engineering exports finished the fiscal at USD 107.04 billion. EEPC India also assisted the government in setting up the targets by participating in all the meetings held by various foreign trade division to review the trade and recommended on strategies to achieve the target. Although, the current global economic and trade scenario doesn't permit us to be very optimistic about the current fiscal, EEPC promises to leave no stone unturned to take Indian engineering to its desired level with all the required support and guidance from the government.

1. Highlights of the Union Budget 2023-24

The Union Budget 2023-24 came out with some promise for the engineering sector. Revamping credit guarantee scheme for MSMEs was a prominent measure recommended by EEPC that was proposed in the budget with infusion of Rs 9000 crore into the corpus. This will enable additional collateral free credit guarantee of Rs 2 lakh crore rupees, which will enable to lower cost of credit by 1 percent. Capital Investment Outlay was increased steeply for the third year in a row and this time by 33% to Rs 10 lakh crore for FY 2023-24, accounting for 3.3 per cent of GDP. Capital outlay for railways was also increased significantly. Emphasis on agriculture, infrastructure and Industry 4.0 will also be beneficial for engineering industry. Apart from these, alteration in Customs duties was proposed for a number of engineering product goods including electrical appliances, automobile, capital goods, aircrafts and bicycle. Some of these measures were in line with the recommendation of EEPC India.

2. Highlights of New Foreign Trade Policy 2023

After a long wait, India's New Foreign Trade Policy 2023 was unveiled on 31st March 2023, the last day of the previous fiscal year. This time, the New FTP was announced with no end date or time period linked to it in order to make the policy more dynamic and responsive to any geo-political and socio-economic changes.

A Special one-time Amnesty Scheme for default in Export Obligations was also introduced. Other key characteristics of the new TFP includes a shift on focus from incentives to tax remission, Greater Trade facilitation through technology, automation, and continuous process re-engineering, Decentralization of export promotion through enhanced participation of states and districts and finally, facilitating international trade settlement in Indian Rupee in a move towards internationalization of Rupee, focus on emerging areas like e-commerce exports, developing districts as export hubs, streamlining SCOMET licensing procedure among others. The new FTP also adopted a number of measures towards boosting of manufacturing within the country.

Move towards internationalization of rupee was in line with the recommendation of EEPC India. Focus on e-commerce was also suggested by EEPC. Enhancement of exports through FTA route was also very much in the list of EEPC India suggestion. Moreover, some measures taken for MSMEs were also recommended by EEPC India. EEPC India welcomed this new FTP and believes that successful implementations of the policy initiatives will achieve the merchandise export milestone of USD 1 trillion by 2030.

3. Steel at Export Parity Price

Due to hike in the price of steel, the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, along with ISA formulated a policy on 'Steel at Export Parity Price' via Office Memorandum Ministry of Steel dated 24.06.2020. EEPC India welcomed the Steel at Export Parity Price scheme and suggested that the scheme should be streamlined and should be made user friendly, the scheme should bring under its fold all large-scale producers including Tata Metalliks, Vedanta and Usha Martin and the products covered under the scheme should also be expanded and billets, galvanized coils and pig iron should also be brought under its ambit.

4. Extension of the reimbursement of Steel Prices

There is an agreement between the steel producers and the secondary users for a reimbursement of RS 3000/ tonne to address the high steel prices in the country as per the advice of CIM. Reimbursement under this scheme was last received in September 2022. This needs to be revived and the pending compensations needs to be cleared given that the steel prices are again high.

5. Free Trade Agreement related

After UAE, India signed another agreement with Australia. The FTA between India and Australia also known as the Economic Cooperation and Trade Agreement (ECTA) was signed in April 2022 and subsequently entered into force in December 2022. Through this FTA Australia has offered zero-duty access to about 96 percent of Indian exports. Meanwhile India has granted preferential access to 70 percent of Australia's exports to India. Over the next five years, this FTA is expected to boost trade between the two nations. At present the government is negotiating with Australia to bring out a more comprehensive bilateral agreement in the form of a Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Agreement (CECA).

EEPC India has continuously provided feedback to the government regarding preferential tariff lines, rules of origin and non-tariff barriers after gathering inputs from members. Some of the other major negotiations in which EEPC India provided feedback recently includes:

- a. India-EU BTIA
- b. India-UK FTA
- c. India-Canada FTA

6. Intervention in other Issues that has adversely impacted / apprehended to impact the industry

a. EU Carbon Protectionism

Green protectionism: Recently EU policymakers reached a deal to implement Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism which aims to slap emission taxes on certain imports. This is an attempt by the EU to protect its domestic industry who have to abide by EU's strict climate laws from any unfair competition from countries with weaker rules. There will be additional import duty on products including cement, fertilizer, iron and steel, Aluminium, etc. Once implemented it will have significant downward impact on India's exports of Iron and Steel and Aluminium to EU. The transitional phase of the EU's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM) will enter into force as of 1st October 2023.

b. EU GSP withdrawal and safeguard:

GSP is one of the EU's largest preferential trade schemes, which removes import duties from products coming into the EU market from vulnerable developing nations. India is one of the 11 Standard GSP beneficiaries of EU GSP but EU announced the withdrawal of GSP benefits for India from January 1, 2023. As EU is a very important market for Indian engineering industry

EEPC India requested the government to have a discussion with EU regarding the withdrawal. Also, in case the withdrawal becomes eminent, Indian government should negotiate the EU FTA in such a way so as to offset the losses incurred due to the GSP withdrawal.

c. Regarding EU TRQ

The TRQ Quotas were levied by EU on 28 Products in year 2019. This was to be in effect for 3 Years but in year 2022 the same has been extended by EU upto 30th June 2024.

These Quotas are actually harming the EU users since the current EU mills due to energy cost and cut in capacity are having long deliveries as well as higher prices by App. 15% to 20% than Imported Goods. After the completion of the Quotes which normally gets exhausted on 1st day of Quarter in many products the balance period of the Quarter the EU Importer has to clear the imported material by paying 25% Safe Guard Duty. Substantial amount of Safe Guard Duties is being paid by EU Importers already thus increasing the costs of EU manufactured goods and leading to inflation in the EU market. These Safe Guard Duties need to be removed or the Safe Guard Quota Quantities need to be substantially increased.

It is pertinent to point out that at WTO Disputes Resolution Panel the WTO Ruled against EU in favour of Turkey on this issue but so far, the Tariff Quotas have not been discontinued.

d. CB Marking for Pumps

CB marking is one of the major requirements for the exports of pumps. It was previously informed that BIS has been designated as the "World Body" to provide CB marking to pump manufacturers however as of yet neither has BIS provided any CB marking nor has it designated an Indian lab for this purpose. At present the pump exporters need to get their certification done from other countries that makes testing process quite expensive and time-consuming.

e. Payment problem with Russia

At present, some of our exporters have been facing payment problem with Russia as several Russian banks are under sanction by US and European authorities and Indian banks sometime are not issuing BRC if payment comes to these sanctioned banks. Moreover, future of Rupee trade is becoming uncertain as due to high import from Russia, Russian exporters are having huge amount of unutilized rupee in the coffer.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT & ACCOUNTS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of EEPC INDIA (Company Limited by Guarantee) ("the Company") which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2023, the Statement of Income & Expenditure and the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ('Act') in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2023, its surplus and Cash Flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the standards on auditing specified under section 143 (10) of the Companies Act, 2013. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the code of ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the code of ethics.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key audit matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Reporting of key audit matters as per SA 701, Key Audit Matters are not applicable to the Company as it is an unlisted company.

Information other than the financial statements and auditors' report thereon

The Company's Working Committee is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Directors' Report including Annexures to Directors' Reportbut does not include the financial statements and our auditors' report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the standalone financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and those charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

The Company's Working Committee is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") with respect to the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Company in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting standards specified under section 133 of the Act. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statement that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The company's Working Committee is also responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

 from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit
 evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the
 Company's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw
 attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to

modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.

• Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

1. This report does not include a statement on the matters specified in paragraph 3 and 4 of the Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2016, issued by the Central Government of India in terms of sub-section (11) of section 143 of the Companies Act, 2013, since in our opinion and according to the information and explanation given to us, the said order is not applicable to the Council, which is a Company licensed to operate under Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956.

- d) In our opinion, the aforesaid financial statements comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014;
- e) As reported to us, we report that none of the members of the Working Committee is disqualified as on 31st March, 2023 from being appointed as a member of the Working Committee in terms of Section 164(2) of the Companies Act, 2013;
- f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls over financial reporting of the company and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in Annexure A; and
- g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit & Auditors) Rules, 2014, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:
 - i) The Company does not have any pending litigations which impact its financial position.
 - ii) The company did not have any such long-term contracts including derivatives contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses.

NOTES ANNEXED TO AND FORMING PART OF THE BALANCE SHEET AS AT 31ST MARCH, 2023 AND STATEMENT OF INCOME & EXPENDITURE FOR THE YEAR ENDED ON THAT DATE.

NOTE-1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- 1.1. Income and Expenditure specially those relating to specific projects/events are accounted on accrual basis for which budget approval has been granted and not necessarily in the year of incurrence of expenditure. Any payment / receipt on account of such specific projects/events kept under advances / liabilities till the year of budget approval.
- 1.2. Expenditure related to various Code and other specific activities are booked under those functional heads to conform to the budgets approved by the Government of India. As such, expenses shown under various natural heads are not necessarily the total expenditure incurred under these particular heads.
- 1.3. Income from Membership Subscription is not taken into account unless received except in case where the Tax Invoice issued under GST was raised for such subscription.
- 1.4. Items of printing and stationery are charged to Statement of Income & Expenditure of the year in which the same are purchased.
- 1.5. Pursuant to the policy adopted by the management in the year 1982-83, the expenditure on Publication is directly charged to Income & Expenditure account and no stock of publications at the end of the year is accounted for, as these are considered purely export promotional literature.
- 1.6. Provision for Gratuity & Leave Encashment is based on actuarial valuation on the present value of future liability which includes Rs.50.01 Lakhs (P.Y Rs.44.66 lakhs) being interest on earmarked investments of Gratuity & Leave Encashment fund directly credited to the Provision for Gratuity & Leave Encashment Account.

1.7. **Depreciation:**

The Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, amortization and impairment loss, if any. Depreciation has been provided on the basis of the useful life of the Property, Plant & Equipment prescribed in Schedule – II of the Companies Act, 2013 under the Written Down Value Method.

1.8. **Foreign Currency Transaction:**

Transactions through the foreign currency bank accounts maintained by the Council have been translated at the standard fixed rates adopted for the year and not at the actual rate prevailing on the date of transaction. The other transactions in foreign currency have been accounted for at the actual rates prevailing on the date of transaction.

1.9. **Government Grant:**

The Council receive various government grants that require compliance with certain conditions related to the Council's operating activities or are provided to the Council by way of financial assistance on the basis of certain qualifying criteria. Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received upon the council complying with the conditions attached to the grant.



1.10. Property, Plant & Equipment:

The Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, amortization and impairment loss, if any. The cost comprises the purchase price and other costs attributable to bringing the assets to their working condition for their intended use but excludes duties and taxes recoverable from the taxing authorities.

1.11. Impairment of Assets:

If the carrying amount of property, plant or equipment exceeds the recoverable amount estimated by the management on the reporting date, the carrying amount is reduced to the recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is measured as higher of the net selling price and the value in use determined by the present value of estimated future cash flow.

1.12. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities & Contingent Assets:

Provisions involving a substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognised when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Contingent Liabilities are not recognised but are disclosed in the Financial Statements. Contingent Assets are neither recognised nor disclosed in the Financial Statements.

1.13. The accounting policies not specially discussed above are in consonance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India and are being consistently followed. The Financial statements of the Council are presented in Indian Rupees and all values are rounded off to Lakhs upto two decimal thereof, except when otherwise indicated.

- i) The title deed of Immovable Property held by the council is in its own name.
- ii) The council has not revalued its property, plant & equipment during the year.

NOTE-4: OTHER EXPLANATORY INFORMATION

- 4.1. Every member of the Council other than the Officials of Government undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Council in the event of the same being wound up during the time that he was a member or within one year afterwards, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the Council contracted prior to the date on which he ceases to be a member and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up the same and the adjustment of the right of the contributories among themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding Rs.1,000/- in the case of Ordinary Members and Rs.250/- in the case of Associate Members.
- 4.2. Secured Loans to employees for house building and purchase of vehicles include cases where mortgage/lien could not be created till the year end.
- 4.3. The Council is separately maintaining bank accounts (including deposit accounts) in connection with EEPC Pension Fund, International Price Reimbursement Scheme etc. as a custodian only, which are not forming part of the Council's accounts.
- 4.4. a) The Council is maintaining a Joint Bank Account for making joint payments on behalf of itself and other occupants in relation to the office space acquired in the International Trade Facilitation Centre at Kolkata. As the Council is only acting as a custodian of this bank account, the same does not form part of its accounts.
 - b) The said bank account was opened for the convenience of these occupants in making those payments which are common in nature, such as, premises maintenance expenses, security services, electricity, water supply, lift maintenance etc. The funds required for such expenses are contributed by all these occupants on a mutually agreed basis.
- 4.5. No provision for Income Tax has been made in the accounts as the Council does not expect any liability on this account.
- 4.6. Contribution from participating members as shown in Note 2.13 includes amounts towards exhibitions, publicity, conferences etc.
- 4.7. In the absence of confirmation from the parties, various accounts like Loans & Advances, Deposits, Trade Payables etc. remain unconfirmed.
- 4.8 Previous year's figures have been regrouped/rearranged and nomenclature changed to make them comparable, as far as practicable, with those of current year.
